Tips and Tricks for Using Qualtrics	Rebecca Roadman	<p>Qualtrics is a powerful and time-saving survey tool that is available to Pitt staff. It can be used for a range of data collection needs, from formal surveys to applications and registrations. Qualtrics comes with built-in reporting features and data-export capabilities for complex analyses.</p> <p>This workshop is intended for users at all levels—whether new to Qualtrics, or interested in exploring advanced features. <i>Participants should come to the session with at least one data-collection idea or need (real or fake), that they will develop during the session.</i></p> <p>The workshop will address: How to create new surveys, basic survey design, display and skip logic, quotas, custom messages, auto and standard reports, sharing surveys, survey distribution, and data exports.
